

In the pipeline

An area that began as a squatter camp and now has a school and homes, but still no running water or sanitation will be home for two weeks this July for Mark Horner, a project engineer on the South Hook LNG Jetty Refurbishment.

The camp is in Durban, South Africa; the second most dangerous city in the world, and Mark is leading a ten strong team of young people from the UK in projects working with street children.

The project has been organised by Tearfund, a leading relief and development charity, working in partnership with Christian agencies worldwide. One of its visions is to see lives and communities transformed.

Sharron Hardwick, Tearfunds Media Officer for Pembrokeshire said 'It sounds like it will be an exciting, but very challenging mission, especially as he is visiting the second most dangerous city in the world, Mark and the Team need our support and prayers.'

Mark, who worships at Broad Haven Baptist Church says "I know that anything that we do will have impact, and hopefully leave a legacy into the future.'

So for Mark it is from refurbishing a jetty to refurbishing a classroom for a while. He has been trained to deal with such an overseas assignment – let's hope he remembers his skills in erecting a mosquito net. We wish him and the team well.
